

My name is **[REDACTED]**, a current PhD student in Dundee, and environmental campaigner. Over the last few months, alongside others, I have been campaigning to see a ban on "disposable" vapes. After seeing a rise in vaping litter, they caught my attention and led me down a rabbit hole looking into what they were, the waste they produce, and the many issues/unintended consequences we are seeing now that they are becoming mainstream. Just this weekend I found <u>55 while on a 1 hour (4 mile) walk of Dundee</u> as a bit of research into the topic.

Litter is one thing, but the wasting of precious materials such as lithium batteries and lots of single-use plastics, these items are a nightmare. On top of this, there is no clear way on how to dispose on the packaging or retailers' websites. Landfill/incineration is wrong and a fire risk, but they cannot be recycled curbside. Zero Waste Scotland confirmed that they need to be handled as WEEE meaning a local recycling centre trip, which isn't easy for those without access to cars. I have been working with my old MP Kirsten Oswald SNP, and we managed to direct a question to Westminster revealing the lack of environmental assessment on vapes, and secured a debate in Westminster Hall in December. Kirsten has been great in providing research, insight, and support, however, has been unable to commit to a ban being the right way forward. I have since connected with my Dundee MP, MSPs, and councillors on the matter, many showing support for a ban and/or tighter restrictions.

The Green Alliance published an open letter to Westminster environment and health ministers calling for a ban on "disposable" vapes on the grounds of not just environmental reasons but also because these have a huge impact on young people. Myself, and other Scottish organisations like Keep Scotland Beautiful, Marine Conservation Society, and ASH Scotland signed this letter. Except an acknowledgement that they are an issue, and a greater need for producer responsibility to follow takeback recycling schemes, there has been a stalling of progress down south. Thank you for your email, dated 9 January 2023, to the Minister for Environment and Land Reform. I am replying as the Minister with portfolio responsibility for the circular economy, which includes the impact of single-use items. I apologise for the delay in responding.

I would like to congratulate on the success you have had in raising awareness of the issue of single-use vapes. I understand your concerns around the correct disposal of these products and the littering you have witnessed in Dundee. The littering of vapes is illegal, unsightly and harmful to our communities, environment and wildlife – there is no excuse for this behaviour anywhere in Scotland. You are correct that e-cigarettes or vapes should not be thrown away in general waste and should be disposed of at small waste electrical and electronic equipment receptacles widely available at household waste recycling centres.

As you know, I have asked Zero Waste Scotland to examine the impact of single-use vapes and consider options to tackle the issue. A report is expected in May. Ministers will then consider the evidence, expert advice and policy options, which could include a potential ban on single-use vapes. I would be happy to discuss this matter further with you.

While our aim is to provide information whenever possible, in this instance the Scottish Government does not hold the information you have requested as no meetings have been held between Laura Young and Scottish Environment Ministers regarding vaping, between 1st January 2022 to date.

Therefore, this is a formal notice under Regulation 10(4)(a) of the EIRs confirming that the Scottish Government does not hold this information.

This exception is subject to the 'public interest test'. It is important to note that although we do not hold the information and have applied Regulation 10(4)(a) – information not held, it is a requirement that we have to apply the public interest test.

Under regulation 5(1) of the EIRs, a Scottish public authority that holds environmental information must make it available when requested to do so. This duty is not absolute. In some cases, information is excepted from disclosure, under regulations 10 and 11 of the EIRs. However, all of the exceptions in regulation 10 (and parts of regulation 11) are subject to a public interest test. To clarify, even though we do not hold the information, because we are using EIRs Exception 10(4)(a) in response to your request, we are required to apply a public interest test.
